COURSES TAUGHT

- **POPULATION & FAMILY POLICY PRACTICUM** (Summer 2017, Summer 2018, Summer 2019). DIS Copenhagen. This 1-credit faculty-led program explores three topic areas on comparative social policies: Integration and Multiculturalism in Denmark; Sexuality Education in the European Union; and Changing Family Patterns in Scandinavia and includes site visits to the Danish Ministry for Children and Social Affairs, to a Danish middle school, a mosque, the Rockwool Foundation, and Sex

and Society, Denmark's largest non-governmental organization (NGO) in the field of sexual and reproductive health and rights.

- **CHILD DEVELOPMENT: THEORY AND PRACTICE** (Summer 2016). DIS Copenhagen. This 4-week course combines classroom learning in childhood and adolescence, with a learning lab immersion experience at summer camps and community organizations. The goal of the course is to introduce students to elements of education for children and young people in urban areas through active cultural and leisure activities. Students engage with children using their learning from the classroom to understand Danish/Nordic pedagogy in a hands-on context. The course includes a Study Tour to Helsinki, Finland.

SELECTED RESEARCH EXPERIENCE

- **PLAYING HARD OR HARDLY PLAYING? DO PARENTS PROVIDE OPPORTUNITIES FOR INFANT LEARNING THROUGH PLAY?** (Current). This project examines the ways in which infants' play enhances learning. Parents' choice of infant play materials, how toy marketing may shape these choices, and whether parents view play as more effective for learning in infants than preschoolers will be assessed. Results will highlight the relation among parental views on infant learning, different forms of play and learning activities, and toys first-time parents of young children value.
- **PARENTING AND CHILD LEARNING: THE ROLE OF PARENTAL BELIEFS ABOUT CHILD LEARNING AND LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT** (Current). This project examines the ways in which young children's play with certain types of toys can promote learning and cognitive development. Caregivers' beliefs about early learning, their rationale for toy selections, and interactions with their toddlers in a play session will be assessed. Results will highlight the relation among parental beliefs about learning, access to quality toys and infant learning.
- **ENHANCING THE COMMUNITY IMPACT OF SCHOOL-BASED HEALTH CENTERS IN RURAL NEW YORK VIA PARENTING EDUCATION: A PILOT STUDY** (Current). This integrated research-extension pilot project explores the feasibility and impact of expanding existing services provided by School Based Health Centers (SBHCs) in rural NY to enhance sustainability of families and communities and to promote a culture of health. The extension component entails community-based intervention to provide parent education in SBHCs; the research component examines impact of SBHCs and parent education.
- **RELATIVES RAISING YOUTH PROJECT** (Current). This project examines the well-being of youth (aged 12-18) being raised by a grandparent. Data collection consisted of in-person surveys, open-ended questions, and videotaped interactions between grandparents and grandchildren to gather detailed information on aspects of the grandparent/grandchild relationship such as parenting behaviors, relationship quality and family routines. Current efforts include analyzing trends in the data and summarizing the finding for academic audiences, Cornell Cooperative Extension educators and state agencies that work with families and youth.
